### PROVINCIAL NEWS

Court of Insolvency—Toronto.—In Re Hood—The Messrs. Hogg, doing business at York Mills, having become embarrassed and finding that some of their mortgage creditors insisted on obtaining judgment, made an assignment of their property to their brother, on the 17th of June last, for the general benefit of creditors. Attempts were made to set this aside, which were unsuccessful. The insolvency act came into effect on the first of September, and soon thereafter Messrs. Wakefield, Coate & Co. and Messrs. Thompson & Burns, creditors to amounts in all exceeding \$500, took steps under section 3, to place the estate in compulsory liquidation, on the grounds of stoppage of payment and the assignment.

A petition was fyled on behalf of the Messrs. Hogg, praying that all further proceedings might be stayed, on the ground that they did not come within the meaning of the act.

On the hearing, before Judge Harrison, it was contended that the stoppage of payment was merely temporary, the Messrs. Hogg owning property of much greater value than their debts; that the assignment was properly executed before the act came into force, and was therefore not affected by the proviso as to "general conveyance or assignment." That such assignment being held a valid conveyance to the assignee, there was now nothing to assign or to be seized by the official assignes, and that the judge had therefore now no authority over the estate and effects already vested in a third party, who was not under the control of the court. That the official assignee would at any rate be only invested with the powers of the insolvents, which was to receive a surplus, if any, after the execution of the trusts in the assignment of the 17th of June, sec 4, sub. sec 7.

The words in the statute, "If he has made any general conveyance or assignment," &c., he is liable to compalsory liquidation, were urged as applicable to this case, on the part of the creditors, but it was held that those words did not give the act a retrospective effect.

In the argument it was stated that the Hon. Mr. Abbott, the framer of the act, had expressed it as his intention that the act should not have an ex post facto operation in assignment made before the act came into force.

His Honor granted the prayer of the petitioners, and dismissed the application of the creditors, without costs to either party.

It might also be stated that one of the Messrs. Hogg being present in court was called by the opposite party to be examined under oath of a witness touching the estate. This was objected to as being unauthorized under the evidence act, but the judge allowed the examination to be proceeded with.—Leader.

# EPEAL OR RUINATION

HE CRISIS REACHED IN THE FI-NANCIAL SITUATION.

The Sherman Silver Bill Must Be Repealed if the United States is to be Saved from Impending Disaster—Congress Called to Meet ugust 7th.

WASHINGTON, June 30 .- The president this evening issued the following proclamation: Executive Mansion, Washington, D.C., June 80, 1893-Whereas the distrust and apprehension concerning the financial situation which pervade all business circles, have already caused great loss and damage to our people and threaten to cripple our merchants, stop the wheels of manufacture, bring distress and privation to our armers, and withhold from our workingmen the wage of labor and whereas the present perilous condition is largely the result a financial policy which executive branch of the government finds embodied in unwise laws which must be executed until repealed by congress: Now, therefore, I, Grover Cleveland, President of the United States, in performance of a constitutional duty, do, by this pro-clamation, declare that an extraordinary occasion requires the convening of both houses of the congress of the United States at the Capitol in the city of Washington on the seventh day of August next, at 12 o'clock noon, to the end the people may be relieved through legislation from present and impending danger and distress. All those entitled to act as members of the fifty-third congress are required to take notice on this proclamation and attend at the time and place above stated.—Given under my hand and the seal of the United States at the city of Washington, on the thirtieth day of June, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, and of the independence of the United States the 117th. (Signed)

The president had left directions for the issuance of this proclamation before his departure for Gray Gable's. The

ELORA CATTLE FAIR.—The Fair of Thesday last was a great success. Goodeleer was worth \$60, the average price paid being \$50, while some of an inferior quality might be quoted at \$4.50. The stores did an extraordinary business, and the hotels had no reason to complain Over three hundred head of cattle were sold on the grounds, and a large number were sold on their way to market. My Whitlaw, of the Elora Mills, purchased nearly nearly four thousand bushels of wheat, paying therefor 74 and 75 cents per bushel. Quite a drove of horse were purchased for cavalry purposes for the American army. Between the beef horse and wheat market, we should judge that over twenty thousand dollars changed hands in Elora on the Fai day. A New Yorker remained in the neighborhood after the Fair and bough up 48 head of splendid cattle at top prices, which he took off yesterday.—


