cussion. Several bad starts were made,
Sayers always getting the advantage. At
the third or fourth attempt Sayers and
Tobin started, but the other men, Randy
McLennan and Tupper McDonald, did not.
The starter called the runners back, but they
kept on and finished as above. The judges
claimed that Sayers did not jump the hurdles
fairly, as he swung his feet in the space
between the hurdles instead of over them.
Sayers would not run over again, and as
Tobin refused to accept the first prize, it was
awarded to Sayers.

THE LACROSSE MATCH.

The great event of the day was the lacrosse
match between the Young Glengarrians and
Cornwall Juniors. The field was soft as the
result of the recent rains and the ball would
not rebound, but both teams put up an ex-
cellent game and the match was equal to
some of the Senior League contests. The
Cornwall Juniors were probably the best

after about 25 minutes play.

wall home shot thick and fast, McGillis, who
had been changed to goal made some won-
derful stops. Then the Glens' field and home
began to show up and after fifteen minutes
hard play, mostly in their favour, Dunbar
Harkness scored.

As the Cornwalls had to leave to catch their
boat it was decided to call the match a draw.
The teams cheered each other and left the
field.

Every man of the twenty-four played good
lacrosse, Cameron, the McDonalds, Tobin,
McAlear and O'Neil being the stars of the
Cornwalls, while McGillis, Sutherland, D. C.
