Dad says he is sure the horse is too far gone to be helped, and any way there were no curative properties claimed for that stuff it being merely a preventive, however he has gone over these times and that is all he has to do. This afternoon Frank and I put through the few bushels of wheat in Ed's big bin which we were saving for chicken feed. Bruce Smith was in for quite awhile this afternoon for a visit. Ench has been down all the afternoon at the dentist and felt pretty rotten over it to night. It has been a nice day today.

#### Wednesday June 21<sup>st</sup>

It started to rain about six o'clock this morning and rained till about nine or ten o'clock. It wasn't a bad day after that sunny and cool. Dad spent most of the morning over at Martin's the horse was so bad this morning that Jim Kells shot it. I didn't do anything much but help Ench tear

the cover off the arm chair as she wants to put a new one on. This afternoon I read & slept most of the afternoon but did go out and put the wheat back in the bin which Frank and I cleaned up yesterday. Just before tea Frank and I went up to Ham Thompson's. Frank was down town this afternoon.

#### Thursday June 22<sup>nd</sup>

This morning Dad left for Charlie Dunkin's to see if he couldn't hurry him up to get the old ram registered and also to pay him the service fee of his ram. I would have gone but Dad thought it as Uncle Ward enjoyed his drives so much on Sunday he would ask him and I thought he would enjoy it more with Dad than with me so I persuaded him to go. They left about ten o'clock and didn't get back till almost five and I guess both of them had a great day of it. Dunkin wasn't home when they got there so they stayed to dinner. Uncle Ward knew him well, used to go to parties with him and I suppose he had a great talk. Dad says his crops and the crops of his near neighbors look immense but that is the only place they do. The rain has been just what they want up there. They saw Frank Moll on their way home and he told them that
