Ether—Practical Administration. No. 12.

The presence throughout of stertor or a slight degree of cyanosis need not alarm unduly, but should certainly cause increased watchfulness since its presence is always indicative of obstruction to the passage of air, though such interference may be exceedingly slight. Many of the more plethoric exhibit cyanosis from the initiation and throughout the anesthesia without apparent significance, but in the arterio-sclerotic cyanosis is apt to be the precursor of danger. Of especial importance in all such cases is the dictum to give the "minimum amount of ether necessary to attain the desired end"—*Dr. J. B. Bogan; N. Y. Med. Journ.*
