

Wednesday November 28<sup>th</sup>

Dad. and Frank got some more wood from the old oak this morning and this afternoon started to clean up the wheat. Lloyd Ryer came up with his ferret this afternoon and after helping awhile to clean up wheat he and Frank went after rabbits but didn't see any. Dad. went over to John Wess's to see how he was today. He feels pretty well as long as he keeps still but can't do any work. Cousin home now. This afternoon I went down town stayed at Aunt's to tea went up to see May and stayed at Aunt's all night. Milder but still freezing.

Thursday November 29<sup>th</sup>

I have been down at Aunt's all day. I went down to the station this morning to meet Aunt Alice who came home on the eleven o'clock train. This afternoon I went up after Aunt's mail and then made three trips up to Col. Smith's after "Saturday Evening Post" and "Country Gentleman". He had a big pile of them and didn't want to destroy them so but we had to take a 4.5 gal. bbl. as there were no others. However said we could have them. I left them at Aunt Alice's till we can get them in the buggy. Dad. and Frank finished cleaning up the wheat today. It held out pretty well with the machine. Dad. went down to see Aunt Alice to night. Much softer today.

Friday November 30<sup>th</sup>

Dad. and Frank hauled the wheat down to the mill this morning in two loads. I went down with them on the second load. Dad. was well pleased with the way the wheat turned out. He didn't expect it would more than pay the bill at the mill but there were about 37 1/2 bushels and Charlie gave him \$2.09 for it so there was about \$4.60 coming to him after the account was paid. This afternoon Dad. and the baby drove down to take Aunt Alice up to the cemetery but it rained so hard they didn't go. Frank went down to the mill again this afternoon to get some feed. They took down some oats this morning and got part of them chopped and traded part off for shorts & feed flour. Rained most of the day.

Saturday November December 1<sup>st</sup>

Frank and I drove Belle and Queen to Simcoe this morning after the bbl. of coal oil which Dad. ordered a week or so ago. We borrowed Mr. Glemming's democat. Dad. only ordered 2.5 gallons supposed to be better. Dad. and the baby went down town this morning and did some shopping and Dad. drove Aunt Alice up to the cemetery. I didn't do anything.
