Meltzer's Sign of Appendicitis.

With the patient supine and the abdomen relaxed the examiner presses firmly with his finger-tips down upon Mc-Burney's point; the patient is then instructed to raise his right thigh, with the keen fully extended. If this movement causes or is inhibited by severe pain, it is strongly suggestive of appendicitis, the organ being compressed between the contracting psoas muscle and the examiner's fingers. It is always advisable to make a comparative test on the left side.—Amer. Journ. of Surg.
