Thursday March 11th

Dad & Dick went to Suicoo on the new car to see Frank Reid and show him the Court proceedings. Dad was delighted at having found his watch which he lost a week or so ago. Mrs. Andrew Jones picked it up on Mallon's crossing the day he lost it and Mrs. Spain told him this morning that she had found it. I went up to the dentist's right after dinner and had my sore wisdom tooth pulled. There were a couple of abscesses on it. He froze it and then did some work for Ray Dill while the freezing was taking effect. Mary was supposed to have some teeth filled this afternoon but Enah came up there and told me Mary didn't feel like coming up so I had a pyorrhea treatment in her time. I went into the bank on my way home as I had notice from them that I had overdrawn my account so I renewed my note and borrowed another \$100. The freezing was going out of my face by the time I got down to Auntie's and it was pretty sore. They got me hot salt water to rinse it with and that helped it a little. We got home about five o'clock both feeling pretty tough. Ina stayed and got tea ready and then walked home. We both felt all in to night and went to bed early. Bright & sunny but a bitter cold N.W. wind. Very cold to night.
