

Aunt Alice so as I had to go up town, we didn't get home till ^{after} noon. Both Mary & the baby stood the journey all right. Mary didn't seem to take very kindly to Dorothy Mary, and raised a row when she went to put her to sleep. It was such an unusual occurrence that we decided it must have been caused by seeing D. M. asleep in her bed. I tried ploughing this afternoon and it went very nicely but was plenty wet enough to get in places. Dad & Frank came out on their way home with some oats that they got at Jack Mason's and Dad wants me to take Queen over to-morrow so that he can take some manure down to Auntie's. Cold east wind this am. Wilder to night.

Thursday April 4th
I went over to the farm first thing this morning and Dad and I got two loads of manure down to Auntie before noon. This afternoon we hauled down one load and went over to the factory and got a load of pea straw for me. The stack is about gone. We changed team at the farm and put Prommer and George on and Dad hauled it out here. I drove Queen out on the buggy. I got a couple of little maple trees at Auntie's which I set out along the road. Frank was working with the tractor on the beach

field all day. Harry B was in great spirits and recited "Sing a song of Siropose" to me two or three times. This was the day when Mr. Parkes was supposed to embark for Canada, so I suppose if all's well we will know before very long whether or not we have a fortune and the extent of it. Very mild, threatening.

Friday April 10th - Good Friday -
I ploughed all day and got a good share of the field turned over. I didn't get a very early start as it was raining early this morning and when I went out after breakfast just a drizzle that died off as soon as the sun came out. It was quite sultry this morning but there was a cool breeze this afternoon. Nothing very exciting happened today. Mary & the baby seem to be doing all right. I walked over to Gus Walkers to get our butter which has been in the can on his stand since Wednesday, he forgot to bring it up with him. I stopped in at the Lamp Kin's on my way home and found Charlie & Carrie there. Charlie informed me that one of my pine logs is down in his flats so that accounts for the 11th one that I never could locate. He said another heavy frost would take it right into Black Creek.
