Diagnostic Hints in Senile Cases—No. 3.

Vertigo in the aged does not always signify cerebral arteriosclerosis. If it is constant and gets worse during the day or after reading, it points to some ocular impairment. If it is relieved when lying down, it is due to cerebral anemia. If it persists after lying down, it is due to arteriosclerosis. Other causes for constant vertigo in the aged are syphilis, which is rare except in the tertiary stage, and neurasthenia or other nervous disease. These can readily be diagnosed. If the vertigo is intermittent, we must eliminate auditory, gastric, and nervous causes before we can say it is due to arterio-sclerosis.—*Nascher; Amer. Pract.*
