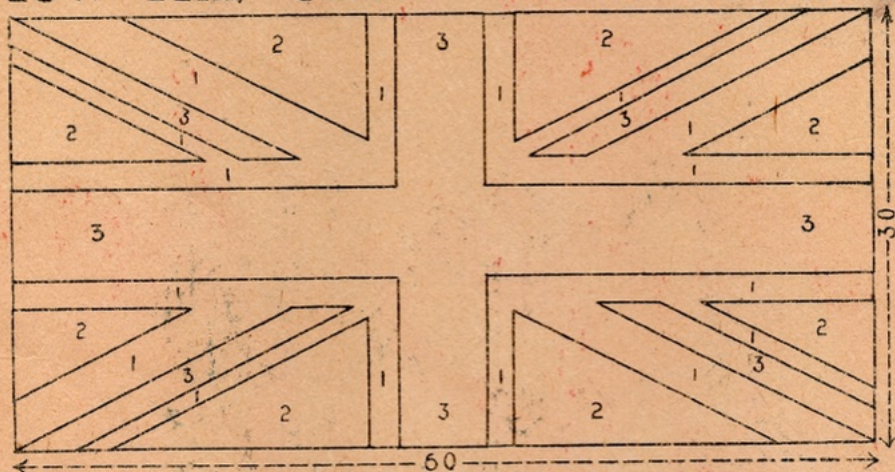

HOW THE UNION JACK IS MADE



In regard to proportion, the Union Jack is twice as long as it is broad. By referring to cut it will be seen that it is made 60 units long by 30 broad.

As the flag is not printed in color, letters have been placed to denote what colors, stripes and fields are—1 represents white, 2 blue, and 3 red.

There are three Crosses used to make the Union Jack, namely, the Red Cross of St. George, White Cross of St. Andrew, and the Red Cross of St. Patrick.

The Red Cross Banner of England (St. George) is claimed by some to have been adopted by Alfred the Great, when in 887 he founded the Royal Navy, and on the Union of England and Scotland in 1707, it was superimposed, or placed on the Scottish flag, which was the White Cross of St. Andrew on a blue ground. Of course if the whole English flag had been so placed it would have completely hidden the other, and so only a narrow strip of the English white "field" was retained about the edges of the Red Cross, to show what that field was, and also because it is one of the rules of heraldry that color should not be placed upon color.

When the flag of St. Patrick, representing Ireland, was brought into the combination in 1808, as the Crosses were the same in shape and size, the difference being only in color, it was decided to divide them into strips, placing them side by side, the St. Andrew's being one-half of its former width, and St. Patrick's one-third. Scotland is the senior of these two countries, so in the left-hand upper corner the white strip, representing St. Andrew, is uppermost, but alternates with that of St. Patrick in the others.

HOTTEST DAY IN JUNE ON RECORD THURSDAY'S HEAT 97 DEGREES

Two Points Below the Highest Mark Ever Reached in Toronto at Any Time—Shirt Waists Came Out in Defiance of All Conventions.

Heat in Toronto yesterday was more than on any June day in the history of the city. By noon, the temperature stood at 90 in the shade, and a couple of hours later it had crept up to 97 in the shade and 110 in the sun. This, breaking all previous June records, was 2 degrees below the hottest day in the annals of the city, which was in 1892, Aug. 24, when the mercury registered 99.2 in the shade.

Says It Was 107.

Mr. Steele, proprietor of the Poplar Club, 107 Yonge-street, near Thornhill, told *The World* last night that the temperature yesterday beat all records in 35 years' residence on the street. At 1 o'clock, the thermometer in front of the door, which was shaded by a large awning, mounted up to 107 degrees, and at 2 o'clock in the afternoon it stood at 110 degrees. For 35 years, Mr. Steele has kept a daily record of the weather and temperature, so that he knows whereof he speaks.

That Tired Feeling.

Yonge-street presented a curious appearance to-day, the torrid heat of yesterday after-noon. Pedestrians, with a bedraggled air, shuffled along, mopping the perspiration from their brows. There was no complaint, no complaining; a feeling of weary lassitude had taken possession of the whole city, which could not be felt as the mercury crept up

Schools Closed Early.

Many of the schools in the city had to be dismissed earlier than usual, owing to the oppressive heat. The teachers declare that, never in their experience, has there been such continued heat during school hours as has struck the city during this spell.

No Serious Prostrations.

'Way down East Queen-street, near Carlaw-avenue, a horse dropped dead yesterday morning, overcome with the heat. Another, belonging to Nasmith's delivery wagon, was prostrated at Kew Beach. Curiously enough, no serious prostrations or fatalities of citizens have been reported.

Looking Backward.

A peep into the mysterious volumes up at the Observatory revealed some interesting facts. Never before in Toronto has the temperature risen above 93 degrees on a June day. This former maximum occurred three times, viz., in 1841, 1864 and 1895. Hot days in July are much more numerous, the highest temperature being 98 degrees, on July, 1854, the same year in which occurred the 99.2 in August, which holds the record for highest temperature in this city.

No Signs of Change.

"There are no indications of any change in temperature to-morrow," said Weatherman Stupart to *The World* late last night. "There are faint signs of a cooler wave coming from the north, but I wouldn't pin too much faith upon its arrival here for some little time. It will be hot all day Friday, and, I believe, Saturday, too."
