Diagnostic Pitfalls in Abdominal Surgery-No. 1.

Beware of diagnosing cholecystitis in the young. They rarely have anything the matter with their gall bladders. When a boy or a girl complains of pain in that region, with fever, tenderness on pressure with rigid muscles, look out for central pneumonia with diaphragmatic pleurisy. Watch the fever. It will be more regular and less of the intermittent type, the pain will be steadier and while there may be no cough nor increased respirations nor any pulmonary symptoms, but in five or six days the physical signs of pneumonia will appear.—Hedges.

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
