Dietl's Crises.

The causation of the occurrence is a twisting of the ureter at its upper part, inducing retention of urine in the pelvis and calices of the kidney, whereby severe pain results from distension of the tissues. The attacks may supervene with great suddenness, and continue for several hours, the pain during this period being of the most agonizing character.

Other accompaniments are nausea, vomiting, hæmaturia, and rigors. The temperature may also rise several degrees. These attacks may be mistaken for recurrent appendicitis, renal colic, or malignant disease of the intestines. The previous history of symptoms caused by movable kidney, along with physical examination of the abdomen, will generally enable a correct diagnosis to be arrived at.—*Clinical Memoranda, Brand & Keith.*
