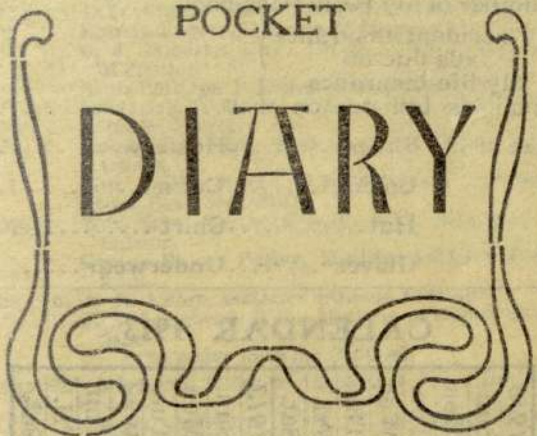

### Eclipses, 1913.

In the year 1913 there will be five eclipses, three of the Sun and two of the Moon.

I. A total eclipse of the Moon, March 21-22, 1913, partly visible, the Moon setting eclipsed. The Moon enters the shadow March 22nd, 5h. 12m., a.m. Middle of eclipse 6h. 58m., a.m. Leaves the shadow 8h. 43m., a.m.

II. A partial eclipse of the Sun, April 6th, 1913. Invisible in North America

III. A partial eclipse of the Sun, Aug. 31st, 1913. Invisible in North America.

IV. A total eclipse of the Moon, Sept. 14-15, 1913. The Moon setting about the time of the eclipse. Middle of the eclipse Sept. 15th, 7h. 48m., a.m.

V. A partial eclipse of the Sun, Sept. 29th, 1913. Invisible in North America.
