Frank helped me rust corn and I helped  
him put the cabbages out in the wagon down cellar  
and we ran the wagon into the orchard. He wants  
to fill it and get another barrel of cider. May & Cash  
went to a bridge party at the Hardings this afternoon.  
I painted a lesson to night. Dull and drizzle

Tuesday December 7<sup>th</sup>

Dad ploughed all day. I did his hair up and then  
Frank and I picked up enough apples to make a  
barrel of cider. This afternoon we husked corn  
to night they all came over here to tea from the  
farm and we had May's birthday present of  
carridge and venison which was delicious. Frank  
left right after tea to go out to a practice at Shand  
Bright to day but quite a cold wind. Aunty Alice  
came over at noon and brought May some forks  
and spoons that Pely Williams sent her and this  
afternoon the whole staff of teachers came over  
and presented her with half a dozen sterling  
four candies. Yesterday she got a very pretty  
little brass kettle on a stand & burner from Elsie & Walter.

Wednesday December 8<sup>th</sup>

The day hard east night and has been freezing  
a little all day. Dad finished his land he was  
ploughing but as the crust was so hard to turn he  
didn't like it again. This afternoon he covered  
the turnip pit again. Frank took the cider apples  
down this afternoon and got the barrel and a 5 gal  
for County filled. May and I went down town to night  
she went to a Girl's Branch meeting and I went to the  
to a meeting of the census committee but they didn't have it
