SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 5, 1870.

I went down to

but that the title
of Pas is all right.
But still we will
inquire into the
matter a little far-
ther as soon as pos-
sible so that we
may know what
to expect. If the
farm is to be sold
I don't wish to wait
any longer in suspense.
I am trying to get
the result of this thing
where it will be into the
hands of my dear old father.
