station and he was telling us the trouble he had had with  
the inspectors. They accused him of being short of funds  
and Quint had to raise over 100. dollars for him on very  
short notice. He apparently didn't know that Quint borrowed  
it from Dad. Later they found they had made a mistake and  
told Hubby they supposed he was agreeably surprised. Hubby  
said not at all as he knew his books were all right. Hubby  
said it was a hell of a rest he got, he was lucky they didn't arrest  
him and the expert who was here relieving left the books
