July 7<sup>th</sup> 1892.

Thurs, 7. Still another fine day, very  
warm. woke up with a terri-  
ble pain in the head and sore  
eye, paining me very much  
all day went to the post office  
received papers from J. Brown  
give a full descriptive acct  
of the Dominion Day there at  
Belleville. Went over and water-  
ed the plants for Mrs Cowan  
returned home lighted the  
the Coal Oil Stove and prepared  
a pint of lemonade. I powdered  
the Stove a success. Mr. Hay  
called on me tonight.

Fri. 8. Very hot to-day. thermometer 80° in  
the shade, not feeling very well  
to-day and also sore eye. Mr. Hay  
says its is inflammation he put some  
eye water on it, and it is much  
better tonight.
